why are most famous historians men how have women changed the writing of history over the last decades what lives and stories have been hidden from history until recently history was predominantly the domain of men that men were the authors of our past meant that in many cases only half of the story was told in the second half of the twentieth century however the picture changed women and indeed some men as well started to address gender history women had been investigated historically

before but never with such intensity nor such breadth the impetus for this writing was both political and academic as feminists were determined to explore lives which until then had been disregarded gender and the historian charts the entry and development of this new history showing how such considerations furthered postmodernism and ultimately reinvigorated the very core of history

this collection of nine essays analyzes the people the protests and the incidents of the civil rights movement through the lens of gender more than just a study of women the book examines the ways in which assigned sexual roles and values shaped the strategy tactics and ideology of the movement the essays deal with topics ranging from the montgomery bus boycott and rhythm and blues to gangsta rap and contemporary fiction from the 1950s to the 1990s referring to groups such as the national council of african american men and events such as the million man march the authors address male gender identity as much as female arguing that slave master relations from before the civil war continued to affect black masculinity in the postwar battle for civil rights whereas feminism traditionally deals with issues of patriarchy and prescribed gender roles this volume shows how race relations continue to complicate sex based definitions within the civil rights movement

an investigation into early modern gardens gender and writing this study considers not only published literary representations of gardens but also actual garden landscapes and unpublished evidence of everyday gardening practice jennifer munroe here analyzes how writers appropriated the developing gendered tension in gardening that stemmed from a shift from the garden as a means of feeding a family to the garden as an aesthetic object imbued with status

beginning from the premise that psychology needs to be questioned dismantled and new perspectives brought to the table in order to produce alternative solutions this book takes an unusual transdisciplinary step into the activism of black feminist theory the author suryia nayak presents a close reading of audre lorde and other related scholars to demonstrate how the activism of black feminist theory is concerned with issues central to radical critical thinking and practice such as identity alienation trauma loss the position and constitution of individuals within relationships the family community and society nayak reveals how black feminist theory seeks to address issues that are also a core concern of critical psychology including individualism essentialism and normalization her work grapples with several issues at the heart of key contemporary debates concerning methodology identity difference race and gender using a powerful line of argument the book weaves these themes together to show how the activism of black feminist theory in general and the work of audre lorde in particular can be used to effect social change in response to the damaging psychological impact of oppressive social constructions race gender and the activism of black feminist theory will be of great interest to advanced students researchers political activist and practitioners in psychology counselling psychotherapy mental health social work and community development

detailing the history of a well known phenomenon of post socialism cross border petty trade and smuggling as the history of a practice in daily life from a gendered perspective this book considers how changes in these practices in a particular border region between belarus and lithuania have been accompanied and to some extent provoked by changes in the border regime it looks at how the selective openness of the belarus lithuania border worked during different periods over the last twenty years and how it influenced the involvement of different social groups in shuttle trade practices foremost this book considers how political borders implement and or intensify social boundaries and suggests that the selective openness of political borders a prerequisite for the existence of female shuttle trade activities is primarily built upon people s social characteristics however it claims that what can be seen as the grounds for growing inequality at a global level at a local one may have an important resourceful meaning for various social groups including those usually perceived as disadvantaged such as widowed female retirees or unemployed single women with children

this book based on 25 months of anthropological fieldwork examines activists and activism in palestinian nongovernmental organizations in israel it concentrates on the ways organizations enable certain processes of self identification based on activists constructions of modernity

this book uses detailed case studies of two secondary schools to examine the relationship between curriculum choice and gender identity among fourteen year old pupils making their first choices about what subjects to pursue at exam level it reveals a two way process pupils decisions on what subject to take are influenced by how they perceive themselves in gender terms and the curriculum once chosen reinforces their sense of gender divisions the author looks at the influences on pupils at this stage in their lives from peers family and the labour market as well as from teachers she argues that the belief

in freedom of choice and school neutrality espoused by many teachers can become an important factor in the reproduction of gender divisions and that unless the introduction of the national curriculum is accompanied by systematic efforts to eradicate sexism from the hidden curriculum it will fail in its aim of creating greater equality of educational opportunity among the sexes
